We intend to get at the roots of the system characterised by accumulation for accumulation's sake and acquisitive individualism. From there we will proceed to the other side of the barricades in order to ponder the strategies and struggles for resistance and emancipation that are being waged by social movements around the world.

At the same time, we are going to dream, celebrate, imagine, and open ourselves up to the rich contributions of peoples and movements across the world.

Throughout this three-day program we will draw on lessons of the past to better grasp current debates. And we gain insight from the young and the young-at-heart who are involved in popular struggles in Québec, Canada, the USA, Africa, Latin America, Asia and Europe.

We will be able to tap into a huge reservoir of projects, approaches, new ideas and tools that can help us advance, organize, resist and work to WIN.

For centuries, our continent was inhabited by peoples with ancestral knowledge whose wealth had dazzled the Vikings, the Basques and the Bretons when they came to our shores. Later, when capitalism took off, the European conquest perpetrated an immense trauma. Genocide and ethnocide of Native Americans occurred at the same time as the arrival of millions of slaves from Africa. European settlers too have been subjugated under the yoke of systems designed to function in the interest of the 1%.

But our ancestors have not just been victims. They revolted, they organised. The slaves liberated themselves. The poor went on strike. The indigenous people survived and began to reclaim their rights. They have all told their stories, sung of their resistance, and re-imagined their world.

It is this magnificent and tragic epic which is at the centre of the performance of Thomas Hellman and his musicians, Olaf Gundel and Sage Reynold.
